Hopefully you recognized the fellow on this months cover, George S Patton. On my way back from San Diego, on I10 I came across the General Patton Memorial Museum. Its located on the site of the WW2 Desert Training center.

This was an area that Patton was aware of having grown up nearby and chose for a training area. It was close to roads, a railroad, and the Colorado aqueduct for fresh water.

Over 1 million men were trained on 18,000 SQ Miles of desert. Gen Patton wanted hard training to prepare the men for combat so decreed that there would be no permanent barracks or buildings. The conditions mimicked temperatures and conditions later found in N Africa.

The training began with small unit tac-

tics through Army maneuvers and included all combat arms.

The museum includes many well done displays covering wars from WW2 thru Vietnam.

It also includes a number of vehicles and tanks. It was definitely worth the stop!



CAMP YOUNG



Welcome to Camp Young!

From where you are standing, you are surrounded by the perimeter of historic Camp Young. In early April, 1942, troops began arriving. Extreme climates varied from 130 degrees in summer to winter temperatures of near freezing. Rattlesnakes and scorpions crawled into sleeping rolls and boots. Water was rationed to one canteen per day, while the men trained for combat under the desert sun. The harsh environment taught them how to survive in North Africa.

"A pint of sweat will save a gallon of blood."



Look at the wide open spaces around you and imagine 1942, eleven camps with one million soldiers stretching 18,000 square miles - making it the largest military instillation maneuver area in the world. General George Patton saw this uninhabited and desolate desert as an ideal training site for large scale tank and infantry maneuvers against the Nazi Afrika Korps in the North African desert.

What Can I See?

Well placed roads and outlines of the eleven camps can be seen from the air, and artifacts from a time gone by on the desert floor. Many of the artifacts were carried away, taking a part of the story with them. For the enjoyment of those who follow you, please leave all artifacts as you found them.



"I want my men to take just a rough a beating as I can give them in as near the situation they will have in North Africa," General George 5. Patton

Major General George Patton while commanding Ft. Benning, Georgia was called by Ut. General McNair return to Washington D.C. General McNair gave Patton orders to locate, establish, and command a Desert Training Center (DTC). The DTC's purpose would train US soldiers to be prepared for Operation Torch, the planned invasion and liberation of Nazi occupied North Africa.

Patton's first challenge was location. The location needed to resemble the terrain and climate of the deserts in North Africa. The desert climate can be deadly. General Patton knew that the soldiers couldn't beat the Nazi's if they could not survive the desert. Patton's job was to get his soldiers acclimated to fight in the harsh desert conditions and fast, instead of looking anywhere else. Patton who grew up in San Gabriel near Los Angeles knew a perfect area to develop the DTC: 18 thousand square miles of empty real-estate in the Mojave Desert. Patton developed the DTC which extends from Camp Young (near present day Chiriaco Summit') into Arizona and from the Mexican border all the way into the southern Nevada. Patton looked at this area for several logistical reasons beyond the climate and terrain. The area was fairly close to roadways and railways that would allow easy transportation of new troops and supplies into the training center. The Colorado River Aqueduct which proprided Patton with a vital place to make the DTC so successful. All the camps were near the Colorado River or the Aqueduct to offer drinkable water for the troops. Without these key components the DTC would not have been located here.

Incoming soldiers at the DTC had already received prior basic training and specialization before arriving. The purpose of the DTC was to acclimate soldiers for the harsh desert conditions. Conditions that these soldiers would face mirrored North Africa. Scorching hot days with the temperature well above a hundred degrees Fahrenheit and below freezing in the winter. They faced random sandstorms, flash floods and rare thunderstorms, rattlesnakes, and scorpions. Patton wanted his soldiers to experience conditions similar to North Africa. The DTC has no permanent structures, no mess halls, or barracks. The camps were essentially tent cities. The DTC had over a dozen camps in operation; each camp had specific training regiments that tailored to the needs of the divisions that stayed there.

Comp Iron Mountain (primarily used by 3rd Armored Division)

Comp Rice (5th Armored Division)

Comp Laguna (3rd and 9th Armored Divisions and 79th Infantry Division)

Camp Pliot Knob (6th and 85th Infantry Divisions)

General Patton, the Commander of the DTC, stayed at the Headquarters, Camp Young.

Soldiers from the Air Corp, Armored Division, Combat Engineers, and Infantry would spend the majority of their time training and running exercises. Sometimes even training with other camps. The Armored and Infantry Division often ran simulations together.

Only 120 thousand of the over a million troops that trained at the DTC would go to North Africa. For Patton, the DTC served a greater purpose, he wanted to put these soldiers in the harshest training possible so when they would go and face their enemy whether it was in Africa, Europe, or the Pacific Theatre they would be ready. Patton wanted to put the soldiers through hell, that way neither environment nor enemy could give them anything worse.

Major General Patton only spent three months at the DTC before he was once again called back to Washington D.C. this time by the Army Chief of Staff General George C. Marshall. General Marshall ordered Patton to immediately give up his command at the DTC and begin planning and organizing Operation Torch. Greatly grieved that he was not able to return to the DTC, Patton bid his troops farewell in a letter. In this letter he stated:

"Soldiers, owing to circumstances beyond my control, I left you so hastily that I was unable to speak to you personally. However, I would be lacking in gratitude if even at this date, I failed to tell you my sincere appreciation of the magnificent conduct of each and every one of you whom I had the honor to command.

Having shared your labors I know the extreme difficulties under which we worked and I know also how splendidly and self sacrificially you did your full duty, I thank you and congratulate - it was an unparalleled honor to have commanded such men."



AMPS 2023 Show Announcement - Sunglasses, suntan lotion and a beach chair

With the holidays fast approaching, 2022 will soon be in the rearview mirror. It's not too early to start looking ahead to the AMPS International Convention, May 4 - 6, 2023, at the Penn Harris Hotel, in Camp Hill, Pennsylvania.

In addition to the usual categories, the AMPS 2023 show theme "The Pacific" is open to any model, figure, vignette or diorama that fought in a Pacific campaign from 1940 to 2022. For the purposes of this theme, we will define "The Pacific" as any theater of conflict from Burma in the west, to Hawaii and the US west coast in the east, and from Australia and New Zealand in the south to the Aleutian Islands in the north. Examples of conflicts are the entire Pacific Theater, Burma or China in WW2, Korean War, Vietnam, the Cold War in Korea, or other documented conflicts in that region (i.e., the UN peacekeeping action in East Timor from 1999 to 2005 and the brief civil wars in Fiji during 1994, 2000, and 2006).

Vendor coordinators, seminar coordinators, show sponsors and many other AMPS members are working behind the scenes to put together a fantastic show this year. Although we are a little more than 20 weeks out from the big show, don't let that time slip away on getting those builds done and please note the following:

Seminar Topic Voting: AMPS conventions always have a variety of excellent seminars led by knowledgeable presenters. For the 2023 show, AMPS is planning to conduct several hands-on "How to" seminars wherein materials for the participants will be provided free of charge though seating will be limited. Several seminar topics are listed for consideration for AMPS members to vote on their choice of what seminars will be presented. Voting can only be done on the AMPS homepage by AMPS members with active memberships. So, go to the AMPS homepage (amps-armor.org1), sign in and scroll down the page to "Seminar Voting" and follow the instructions. Voting is open until December 31, 2022. Results will be announced in early January 2023.

Hotel Reservations: The AMPS special hotel room rate is \$128.00 per night. While no complimentary breakfast is included, the hotel restaurant is offering a 20% discount. WiFi and parking are included in the room rate. Visit the AMPS homepage at amps-armor.org1 and check out how easy it is to register for a room on-line. The hotel will accept room reservations by telephone, by calling 717-763-7117 and quote group code **050323AMP**. The cut-off date for getting the AMPS special rate is April 12, 2023.

Pre-registration: AMPS 2023 show pre-registration opens on January 1, 2023. Pre-registration is a great way to get all the paperwork done beforehand. There is no model limit for this show, so finish up those partial builds and shelf queens and get ready for a great convention weekend.

Call for Judges: AMPS is always looking for more judges to help spread the work around and allow more modelers to enjoy the show. Sharing in the judging duties helps others who might be otherwise working

several judging shifts to enjoy the show. AMPS has judges' training on-line for those who would like to get involved in serving as well as for those who would like a refresher course.

Donations: One of the memorable events at the AMPS convention is the ever popular, always fantastic raffle. Our Raffle Coordinator, Frank Ciccarella reminds AMPS members that donations are always welcome and will only help to make the raffle that much more enticing. Contact Frank on the AMPS homepage ("The Society" link) if you have anything you would like to donate to this year's raffle. New or very good condition items such as kits, tools, reference material, aftermarket sets, etc., would be most welcome.
